

PÀMIES I BERTRAN, Teresa (1919, Balaguer, Lleida—), essayist and novelist. Exiled after the Spanish Civil War, she returned to Catalonia in 1971. She has lived in Mexico (where she studied journalism at the Universidad Femenina), Czechoslovakia, and France. She has written essays in the most prestigious magazines and newspapers of Spain: *Serra d'or*, *Oriflama*, *Canigò*, *Presència*, *Cuadernos para el Diálogo*, *Triunfo*, *Mundo Diario*, and *Avui*.

Her fictional work deals mainly with the personal testimony of important moments of the history of Spain and Catalonia: civil war, exile, clandestinity, etc. This "documentary literature" constitutes most of her fictional world, sometimes in the form of "memories" or in other cases in books so structured. She is also one of the most important and original theoreticians of feminism in Marxist thought.

She has been awarded many literary honors, among them the Premi Joan Estelrich, the Premi President Companys dels Jocs Florals de 1967, and the Premi Josep Pla.
